INTRODUCTION

It is widely known that incidents of physical, emotional, financial and other forms of abuse occur 4 to 10 times more frequently to people with developmental disabilities than to the general public. It is also clear that among the keys to ending abuse are: 1) education about minimizing the risk of unhealthy and dangerous situations, and about identifying and reporting it, and 2) treatment for victims and abusers.

This booklet is designed to be a quick reference for both purposes. It contains free and low cost training resources for consumers, families, providers, schools, and first responders on the types of abuse, how to prevent it, recognize it, report it, and how to help a person who has been abused. It also provides treatment referrals to provide immediate intervention for individuals with developmental disabilities who have been abused or neglected, as well as some resources for abusers.

For the most part, we limited the resources listed here to those that have specific expertise working with people with developmental disabilities. There are a few exceptions if an agency has experience with a broad range of vulnerable populations. We further divided the training and treatment sections into those for adults and those for children, but there may be some overlap. It is always advisable to call first to any therapist or program to make sure it is the right fit for your needs. Some may require referral from the person's regional center.

We did our best to make sure this information was as accurate as possible on the date of publication, but it is subject to change. Area Board 10 does not endorse or guarantee the quality of any specific providers, programs, or training curricula listed in this booklet. Please let us know of other resources you know of for possible inclusion in future editions.
