

VMRC Report: Tony Anderson Exec Dir. -Talked about (Person Centered Planning and Thinking) Trainings for all VMRC staff starting with four lead staff that ultimately will become trainers for other staff to include accounting and IT staff. In addition Mr. Anderson talked about his work on the upcoming National Association of State Directors of Developmental Disabilities Services (NADDDS) report. Mr. Anderson recommends reading report once it is published. He talked about Dental health and VMRC is still waiting on grant funding this project, VMRC is still planning to hire a dental health coordinator. In addition he is hoping to get a grant writer soon as well. Mr. Anderson will also be a keynote speaker at UOP for dental students/professionals on Saturday September 29th 2018. The Focus of the event is around dental services for people with developmental disabilities. He talked about Self-determination and funding to regional centers, he mentioned some resistance from self-advocates and there are few financial management agencies available to meet the need. VMRC board meetings are now every other month, he encouraged all to come. He mentioned that VMRC is considering an ART walk at VMRC; it would be for staff and other professionals at the start and then open to public. VMRC will roll out a new and improved website soon. Mr. Anderson provided the RAC members a handout with a list of VMRC social media sites currently being and asked that members to follow VMRC on social media. It's free to all and the proceeds from art sales benefit the Arc's Artist and Art programs. She also added that her program received a grant from Benito foundation to make repairs to their parking lot. Arc received another grant form Cal-Trans to purchase two new vans for the program.

Art Valdez (FA): No Report-





Central Connections/Expanding Horizons

Central Connections is a center-based day program. At UCP we utilize a person-centered approach to tailor day program to the individual member. This includes daily range of motion exercises to promote circulation, working on personal goals, becoming more independent, communication skills, learning what it means to be a self-advocate and developing the skills to become one's own advocate. Central Connections also offers daily Focus Classes that include a weekly cooking class, sign language class, creativity class and a health and wellness class.

Expanding Horizons is a community-based learning and integration experience. This program allows members to be active members of the community in which they live. Each day the members work to build skills in areas such as independence and self-sufficiency, personal safety, mobility training, self-advocacy, vocational skills and exploration, communication, and use of community resources. Members of this program participate in community service activities, attend social outings, participate in a recycling program, maintain a community garden and stay healthy by participating in various recreational activities.

Transportation Services for outlying cities such as Newman, Patterson, Westley, Waterford, Oakdale and Keyes are provided by UCP.

"Public Input" is defined as verbal comment or written submissions provided to the Board by any person who is not a member of the VMRC Board. Materials will be maintained by VMRC for at least two years from the date of the meeting.

The VMRC Board of Directors reserves the right to determine the form or manner of its response. As a general rule, the Board will not respond to comments or questions that relate to agency personnel policies, the union contract, or collective bargaining issues. However, the Board may, at its discretion, direct staff in executive session to investigate and report on such issues raised under public comment.

*VMRC Policy on Executive Sessions

As provided in California Welfare & Institutions Code sections 4660 through 4669, the Valley Mountain Regional Center Board of Directors may hold an executive session to consider real estate negotiations, appointment, employment, evaluation or dismissal of an employee, staff salaries and benefits, labor negotiations, and any matter dealing with a specifically identified consumer for whom appropriate authorization has not been provided to enable public discussion of the matter. The Executive Assistant shall keep confidential minutes of executive sessions. The subject of each executive session shall be announced prior to and at

SSAN Mission Statement

The Statewide Self Advocacy Network (SSAN) promotes leadership and builds bridges that strengthen advocacy among disability communities by focusing on policy change.

SSAN is a project of the California State Council on Developmental Disabilities. SSAN has 20 members representing the 12 regional offices of the State Council on Developmental Disabilities (SCDD), SCDD, state agencies and nonprofits whose missions are to educate, empower and provide services and support to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. SSAN is a training network built on the idea that SSAN members will train other self-advocates in their communities on issues that impact their lives and will produce stronger advocates who will strengthen the self-advocacy movement across California. SSAN is one of the primary vehicles which SCDD uses to achieve Goal #1 of the State Plan.

SCDD Self-Advocacy Goal #1 in Plain Language – "Californians with developmental disabilities and their families will have increased support to advocate for their rights to achieve: self-determination, integration, and inclusion within their communities."

The 2017-2018 year was full of many accomplishments for SSAN. During the 2017-2018 Federal Fiscal Year, the following structural changes took place:

- The SSAN Officers updated the SSAN membership application and process for regional representatives
- The SSAN Officers reviewed member applications for the North Coast, Central Coast and CFILC vacancies
- The SSAN Officers participated in a leadership training

CRA attended 5 IPPs, 8 transition meetings, 3 human rights meetings, reviewed 5 denial of rights, conducted 7 trainings for staff and residents. VAS attended 13 transition meetings in the community in addition to weekly follow ups. Increased restraint use, medication dosage and errors noticed. FDC administration informed and follow up measures taken.

Canyon Springs

Desert STAR unit admitted the first client this reporting period. CRA participated in 8 IPP meetings, provided 4 rights training to staff, 1 rights investigations, facilitated 5 meetings with court officials and 7 self advocacy meetings

Sonoma Developmental Center transitioned the last individual to the community after 127 years of operation on December 17, 2018. SDC was the oldest facility in California established specifically for serving the needs of individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities. The facility opened its doors to 148 residents on November 24, 1891.

The facility underwent four name changes in its lifetime: California Home for the Care and Training of the Feeble Minded (1891), Sonoma State Home (1909), Sonoma State Hospital (1953), and Sonoma Developmental Center (1986).



Canyon Springs (cont.)

VAS attended 14 IPPs, 6 transition meetings in the community, 2 human rights meetings, 4 denial of rights reviews, 3 regional project meetings, 1 self advocacy meeting. VAS Coordinator and advocates attended the Disability Festival in Palm Desert along with clients from CS.

Porterville

CRA attended 5 human rights meetings, 4 IPPs, 3 People First/human rights meetings, 2 escort reviews, 13 denial of rights reviews, 22 court appearances, 5 rights process meetings. meetings for PIP process. VAS attended at PDC and in the community: 13 IPPs, 6 transition meetings, 5 escort reviews, 24 court appearances, 1 regional project meeting, 3 self advocacy meetings, 2 professional groups. VAS trained one new advocate. PDC admitted 17 clients impacted by the Camp Fire. VAS and CRA are collaborating with FNRC and regional project for placement options.

SCDD began serving individuals at SDC in 1998. In 2001, Sonoma had 883 residents. Of those residents, 205 residents had a personal volunteer advocate from SCDD at their side at each individual program plan meeting. In 2001, SCDD staffed a Clients' Rights Advocate at all DDS facilities. A CRA and VAS Coordinator serve at the three remaining DDS facilities: Fairview Developmental Center, Porterville Developmental Center, and Canyon Springs Community Facility.

SCDD VAS Services Today: The SCDD Volunteer Advocacy Services at Sonoma Developmental Center has five Volunteer Advocates. VAS provides advocacy services to ninety former SDC residents. The Volunteer Advocates will visit their consumers eight times in the following year. The SDC Advocates have served on the VAS project for ten to fifteen years. They bring their professional knowledge of the consumer as well as their deep desire to see that individuals experience greater quality of life in their new homes.



"The Main Building" at Sonoma Developmental Center was constructed in 1908 to replace the administration wing that was severely damaged in the 1906 earthquake. The building served as the main administration building from 1908 to 1957. It was used as the professional education center from 1957 to 1980.

DDS will conduct a warm shut down of the SDC property until June 30, 2019. A collection of local stakeholders called SDC Coalition is gathering information and building consensus on future land use.

SCDD Volunteer Advocacy Services (VAS) community transition current trends
The VAS Project serves approximately 25% of the individuals residing in the DC/CFs. A volunteer advocate or the VAS Project Coordinator provides direct advocacy services for twelve months post placement.

VAS Coordinator advocating for more enhanced community
outings that are meaningful and based on individual interests.
VAS continues to advocate for individuals in supported living
with unmet medical and behavioral needs.
VAS Coordinator and advocates attended thirteen meetings
with clients for transition activity. Lack of volunteer advocate
notification of incidents involving community-based
individuals continues.
VAS is serving seventeen individuals displaced from the Camp
Fire. Advocates are collaborating with families and Regional
Centers on a path back to their home community or alternative
long-term housing. Advocates attended six transition meetings
in the community. Advocates noticing lack of consistent
delivery of services in the GTA due to seasoned staff securing
positions in the Secure Treatment Area and other agencies.
Advocates attended forty-two transition meetings this period
both at DC and in the community. Twenty consumers
transitioned this reporting period with the last consumer
receiving VAS services leaving SDC on Dec 14th. The lack of
available labor impacts the residential and vocational services
in the community. Some residents placed in 2018 do not have
day program services in place. VAS will serve individuals in
the community until December 2019.

The National Core Indicators (NCI) are standard measures used across states to assess the outcomes of services provided to individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families. Indicators address key areas of concern such as employment, respect/rights, service planning, community inclusion, choice, health and safety. All responses to the surveys are confidential. The aggregated data that results from NCI surveys are often used to inform strategic planning, produce legislative reports, and prioritize quality improvement initiatives.

Child Family Survey Mail Out Begins

Mail out for the Child Family Surveys have recently begun. SCDD estimates that over 70,000 surveys will be mailed out to families with from family members. children 3-18 years of age, living in the family home and receiving at least one funded Quality Assessment Project service from Regional Center.

This cycle, families will have the option of mailing in their paper surveys or directly entering their responses on-line.

To date, 1,072 surveys have been completed. Of those surveys completed, 368 have been direct entries






