## Advocacy on Plan to Phase Out Subminimum Wage

- Jan 2022, SB 639 (Durazo) goes into effect, phase out subminimum wage by January 2025
- Jan 2023, SCDD releases transition plan to phase out subminimum wage
- Feb and March 2023 testify in Assembly and Senate Budget Subcommittees on SB 639, transition plan, and benchmarks
- Thank you to Councilmember Maria Marquez for testifying!

## Advocacy on Plan to Phase Out Subminimum Wage

- Transition Plan has:
  - Benchmarks and timelines
    - January 2023: 6,000 people in subminimum wage
    - January 2024: 3,000 people in subminimum wage
    - January 2025: 0 people in subminimum wage
  - 13 priorities
    - Top priority: Establish Employment First Office in Health and Human Services Agency
- Big announcement: Senator Durazo will submit a budget request to establish the Employment First Office!

## **Showcase Cycle 44 Grants: Chime Institute**

- Focus: Inclusive Education
- Title: "Inclusive Model for Self-Determined Living
- Refined inclusive education practices selfdetermination and person-centered planning practices into IEPs
- Reached: 160 students, 145 families, 140 educators, 70 para-educators

# Showcase Cycle 44 Grants: Down Syndrome Connection of the East Bay

- Focus: Mental Health
- Title: "Mental Health & Wellness Alliance"
- Collaboration serving the mental health community and providing people with IDD with training, tools, communication and support access
- Reached: 24 people with IDD, 40 family, 12 clinicians trained, 105 families given resources

## **Showcase Cycle 44 Grants: Parents Helping Parents**

- Focus: Mental Health
- ▶ Title: "Building Strong Families"
- Support Spanish-speaking families to address mental health needs in people with IDD and their families during transition from school to adulthood
- Reached: 4,000 with information, produced 5 videos, engaged 117 parents in a café support group

## **Showcase Cycle 44 Grants: Path Point**

- Focus: Mental Health
- Title: "Upstream Mental Health Support for People with IDD"
- Use "Dialectical Behavior Therapy Skills" and "Mental Health First Aid" to teach "upstream" skills
- Reached: trained 96 self-advocates and 31 trained

    - US Dpt Labor
    - Provides 200 hours subject matter technical assistance for CIE
  - SWITCHE
    - US Dpt of Education \$15M grant to CA Dpt or Rehabilitation

#### **Vaccine Work Continues**

- During Pandemic: over 116,000,000 PPE
- Vaccine work began February 2021 and continues
  - Initially for first-time vaccinations, now largely for boosters
- 66,230 SA & 308,308 FA/others reached through education/outreach activities
- 26,161 people vaccinated
- Collaborated with 81 entities
- Expanding to broader public health work

Musical Prodigy, Pianist, Composer

#### Thomas Greene "Blind Tom" Wiggins

1849 - 1908

Born blind, enslaved, and gifted with an incredible memory, "Blind Tom" was a musical prodigy who played piano by ear and composed music by age five, becoming one of the most famous artists of the 19th century. He could replicate music and repeat speeches mimicking the speaker, even in foreign languages.

Tom was the first Black performer to play at the White House (Pres. Buchanan) and toured the U.S. and Europe, earning up to \$100,000 a year, placing him among the best-paid performing artists of his time. But because of his enslaved status, he received very little money. Instead, his enslaver, Gen. James Neil Bethune, made a fortune from Tom even after emancipation when he became Tom's legal guardian. Although Tom passed before autism was commonly known, most historians believe he was on the autism spectrum. His music inspires people to this day.

Bessie Blount

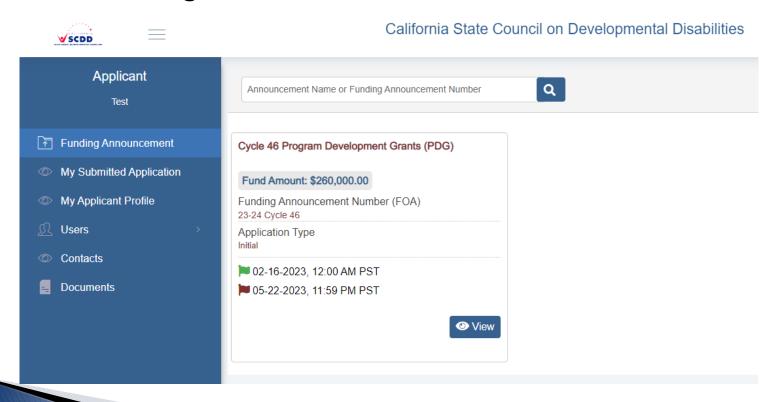
1914 - 2009

Bessie Blount believed that it was important for people with disabilities to be able to feed themselves to have independence and increase their self-esteem. So, using her kitchen as a workshop, Blount invented a device that transported individual bites of food through a tube into a person's mouth. Blount's innovation was one of the earliest forms of assistive technology for people with disabilities.
