#### **NATURALIZATION PROCESS**





**Prepare Form N-400,**Application for Naturalization



**Submit Form N-400**, documents and fees to USCIS



Receive USCIS receipt and biometrics appointment notices



**Go to the biometrics appointment** to be fingerprinted and photographed



**Receive USCIS appointment notice** for naturalization interview



**Complete the interview** 



**Receive a decision** from USCIS on your Form N-400



**Receive a notice** to take the Oath of Allegiance



**Take the Oath of Allegiance** to the United States

#### **STATUTORY PERIOD**



In general, the statutory period is the five-year (or three-year, if married to a U.S. citizen\*) period before the date of application and up to the date of the Oath of Allegiance.



### **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS SUMMARY**





#### Generally, to become a naturalized citizen, applicants must:

- Be at least 18 years old
- Be a U.S. lawful permanent resident
- Meet continuous residence and physical presence requirements
- Live in the USCIS district where they apply
- Have good moral character



#### Applicants must also show:

- Basic understanding of English
- Knowledge of U.S. history and government
- Attachment to the U.S. Constitution

#### TIME AS A PERMANENT RESIDENT



# Naturalization applicants must be a lawful permanent resident for...

- 3 years, if married to a U.S. citizen\*
- 5 years, for all other lawful permanent residents
- Some exceptions apply for military service members, veterans and some children born abroad to U.S. citizen parents



### **3-3-3 REQUIREMENT**



# If applying for naturalization based on marriage to U.S. citizen, at time of filing...

- Applicant must have 3 years as a lawful permanent resident;
- Applicant must be married to same U.S. citizen for 3 years; and
- U.S. citizen spouse must be a citizen for 3 years.



#### **CONTINUOUS RESIDENCE**





# Applicants must have continuous residence in the U.S. during the statutory period.

If outside the U.S. on 1 trip	Continuous residence	
Less than 6 months	Has met this requirement	
6 months to 1 year	Must provide additional evidence	
More than 1 year	Has not met this requirement	

#### PHYSICAL PRESENCE



# "Physical presence" is the time applicant has been physically present in the U.S.

- Physical presence is cumulative (can be multiple trips compiled), and trips one day or more outside U.S. count against "physical presence."
- Applicants must spend HALF of statutory period physically in U.S. (Must have 18 or 30 months total during statutory period)

#### **JURISDICTION**



Applicants must live in the state or USCIS district where they apply for naturalization for at least **three months** before they can be naturalized.

### **GOOD MORAL CHARACTER (GMC)**






- Applicants must show good moral character during statutory period and up to the Oath of Allegiance.
- Committing certain crimes during statutory period shows a lack of good moral character.

#### **KNOWLEDGE OF ENGLISH & CIVICS**



#### **Applicants must...**

- understand, speak, read, and write basic English
- have knowledge of U.S. history and government



Note: Some applicants, because of age and time as a permanent resident, or because of a medical condition, may have different English and civics requirements.

### ATTACHMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION



#### **Applicants must show that they:**

- Support the principles of the Constitution, and
- Supports the good order and happiness of the United States.

#### **Request for Disability Exception (Form N-648)**

- Applicants who have a medical condition that impairs their ability to learn or demonstrate their knowledge can request an exception to the English and/or civics tests.
- Their doctor must complete Form N-648, Medical Certification for Disability Exceptions.
- Only medical doctors, doctors of osteopathy, or clinical psychologists licensed in the U.S. and its territories can complete this form.

# LEGAL GUARDIAN, SURROGATE, or DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVE



- When an applicant is unable to undergo any part of the naturalization examination because of a physical disability, developmental disability, or mental impairment, a legal guardian, surrogate, or an eligible designated representative completes the naturalization process for the applicant
- The guardian, surrogate, or representative addresses every requirement for naturalization and bears the burden of establishing the applicant's eligibility for naturalization

#### **WAIVER OF THE OATH**



- USCIS may waive the Oath of Allegiance because of a physical disability, developmental disability, or mental impairment
- An applicant who needs an oath waiver because of a physical disability, or developmental disability, or mental impairment, may make this request, with the assistance of a legal guardian, surrogate, or designated representative

### **OATH WAIVER REQUEST**



- Request can be done by submitting:
  - Medical Certification for Disability Exceptions (Form N-648 https://www.uscis.gov/n-648,); or
  - A written request with a written evaluation by an authorized medical professional
  - Field offices should work with the legal guardian, surrogate, or designated representative **before** the initial examination to obtain all the necessary documentation

### WHO CAN BE A LEGAL GUARDIAN, SURROGATE, or DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVE



- Who can be a legal guardian, surrogate or designated representative:
  - A person who a proper court has designated as the applicant's legal guardian or surrogate and who is authorized to exercise legal authority over the applicant's affairs; or
  - A U.S. citizen spouse, U.S. citizen parent, U.S. citizen adult son or daughter, or U.S. citizen adult brother or sister, who is the primary custodial caregiver and who takes responsibility for the applicant

#### FILING FOR NATURALIZATION



#### **Application for Naturalization (Form N-400)**

- Paper file Form N-400 by downloading from <u>uscis.gov/forms</u> or file online by creating a myUSCIS account if paying fee
- Review the form/website for instructions, requirements and supporting documentation
- Filing fees and address to send application can be found on website: https://www.uscis.gov/n-400
- Fee waiver and reduced fee waiver also available

- Appointment notice
- · Permanent resident card
- ID
- Passports and re-entry permits, if any
- Birth, Marriage, Divorce, Death certificates, if any
- Court documents for convictions, if applicable
- Legal name change documents, if applicable
- Originals of what you submitted

#### THE PERSONAL INTERVIEW



#### **An Immigration Services Officer will:**

- Place you under oath
- Give the reading and writing tests
- Give the civics test
- Assess ability to speak and understand English
- Review the Form N-400 to determine eligibility


#### **IN-PERSON INTERVIEW**



- Plastic screen separates you from the officer
- Reading and writing test is on the tablet
- You will review your information on the tablet
- You will sign the tablet







#### **AFTER THE INTERVIEW**



- The officer will give you a document with the outcome.
- If you are approved, you may attend an oath ceremony on same day or a later date.
- The oath ceremony is when you become a U.S. citizen.
- If you do not pass, you will have a second interview in 60 to 90 days.
- The officer may request more evidence from you in a letter.

#### **NEED LEGAL ASSISTANCE?**



- U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) accredited representatives are eligible to represent you before USCIS.
  - They must work for an approved non-profit, religious, charitable, social service or similar organization.
- Immigration attorneys can also assist.
  - Check for license to practice law and background for previous suspensions
- Immigration consultants/preparers cannot provide legal assistance.
  - They can only do simple clerical functions.

#### **HELPFUL REMINDERS**



- If you cannot file online, be sure to submit the correct version of the form and mail certified/registered.
- Name changes may not be allowed for all USCIS districts.
- Give yourself extra time to look for parking and clear security.
- Visit our website or call Contact Center at 800-375-5283 for general information.
- Make sure to update all address changes within 10 days of moving on our website or in your account.
- New receipt notices will have a 2 year automatic extension of current green card.
- If you're feeling sick for any reason, request a schedule with no penalty by either calling the Contact Center or writing directly to the office.

# **AUTHORITY: SECTION 504 OF THE REHABILIATION ACT**



- Section 504 states: "No otherwise qualified individual with a disability in the United States . . . shall, solely by reason of his or her disability, be excluded from the participation in, or denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity conducted by an Executive agency. . . . "
- Individual served or encountered
  - Examples: applicants and petitioners, witnesses, stakeholders, representatives, guests at naturalization ceremonies

### N-648 OR ACCOMMODATION REQUEST



- Accommodation = Modification
  - An accommodation is a change in a USCIS practice or procedure that allows a qualified individual with a disability to participate in our programs and activities and access our benefits.
- N-648 = Exemption
  - With this form, your medical professional may suggest you should be exempt from all or part of the English language and US Civics testing requirements

#### **ACCOMMODATION EXAMPLES**

- Accompany: relatives/guardian may accompany applicant during USCIS visit
- Wheelchair loan: request wheelchair from USCIS
- Reschedule: can request a reschedule of appointments
- Expedited Scheduling: can request an expedite request due to urgent/humanitarian medical or health needs

- Home Visit: USCIS can visit applicants at their home/hospital if applicant cannot visit USCIS for their interview
- Simplified Language: applicants can request officers state questions in simple language
- Nonverbal Communication: relatives/guardian may assist during the interview

#### **HEARING ACCOMMODATIONS**



- Sign Language Interpreters/Certified Deaf Interpreters (CDIs)
- Captioning/CART
- Pocket Talker/ALD
- Writing/Typing

## HEARING RELATED ACCOMMODATIONS



- Deaf Interpreters
- Home Sign
- Foreign Language Sign Language Interpreters (SLIs)
- Bringing your own SLI
- Vocabulary in interview
- Video Remote Interpretation (VRI)

## VISION RELATED ACCOMMODATIONS



- Braille
- Large Print
- Oral reading and writing tests

## OTHER NATURALIZATION TESTING ACCOMMODATIONS



- Breaks
- Extra time
- Civics test in writing (vs. orally)

### **HOW TO MAKE YOUR REQUEST**

- Online request forwarded to assigned office
- Appointment Date needed...
- Description- detailed as possible
- Include phone number AND email
- Include with application when filing
- If necessary, call Contact Center 800-375-5283

### WHEN TO MAKE YOUR REQUEST



 To request Sign Language Interpretation, Captioning, and/or Home Visit:

Request as soon as you receive your appointment notice

Everything else:

At the time of the appointment

# WHAT TO EXPECT After Making REQUESTS IN ADVANCE



- Sign language Interpreter- CONFIRMATION.
- An email summarizing the granted accommodations.
- When clarification is needed, a phone call or email to you.
- Accommodations are provided.

#### **ACCOMMODATIONS DENIALS**



- If your request is denied, the Public Disability Access Coordinator has been consulted.
- To request reconsideration of a denial, you can:
  - Use online tool: <u>https://egov.uscis.gov/erequest/displayAccomForm.do?entryPoint=init&sroPageType=accommodations</u> or
  - Email the USCIS employee that you have been working with on the accommodation
- Requests must be made 7 days after receipt of denial

#### **YOU WILL NOT RECEIVE:**



#### You will not get a response saying that your request...

- Was 'forwarded on & you'll hear back'
- Has to be made in a different way.
- Needs medical documentation (few exceptions).

# WHAT IS NOT A DISABILITY ACCOMMODATION REQUEST



The following are not **disability accommodation requests**:

- Exemption/N-648
- Inability to speak English NOT due to a medical condition
- Case Status

#### **CIVIL RIGHTS COMPLAINTS**



- The public may seek recourse by filing a complaint with DHS'
