Adaptive Parent Project: Description

To create a continuing education curriculum to improve communication between healthcare providers and patients with I/DD

To develop accessible, user-friendly, inclusive educational material for patients with I/DD in plain language

Adaptive Parent Project: Description

(Cont.)

Target population: Individuals with I/DD that live in the state of California and healthcare providers who serve this population

Input and feedback: Open to all residents of California regardless of region

Collaborative partners: Rady Children's Hospital San Diego (RCHSD) San Diego County Breastfeeding Coalition (SDCBC) and Gia's Club

Adaptive Parent Project: Implementation & Outcomes

10 chats with 10 participants (SA & FA)

6 meetings with 6 participants
(SA, FA, and professionals)

1 webinar with 27 participants (professionals & others, including international participants)

Implementation & Outcomes (Cont.)

Expanded on current best practices from research articles that focused on people with I/DD in each of the eight (8) specialties covered

Researched healthcare professionals, communication strategies, and supporting individuals with I/DD

The volume of research and scholarly articles dedicated to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) remains limited.
